I originally wrote something like this more than 20 years ago for a religious school bulletin when our daughters (or at least one of them) were in preschool at the old JCC.

I told the story of how I was working at the soup kitchen on a particular day. It was winter and a really, really, cold day. The power had gone out at the JCC, but I decided to leave the girls there that day even though they didn't have any heat. I realized how fortunate we were that they had a place to be.

I was serving lunch to people who had stood in line for an hour, on a below-freezing morning, to get a meal that may be the only one they got that day.

My daughters, on the other

hand, had lunch, coats and a roof over the head and would be picked up in a few hours.

One weekend last month, when the temperatures were at or below freezing during the day, we had no heat in our house. We did however have electricity, hot water, food, warm beds (albeit with many extra blankets), and each other. Our being without heat was an inconvenience, a decent size one, but an inconvenience nonetheless.

On Jan. 15 we joined the greater community in what has become the annual Martin Luther King Day of Service, a joint program combining different communities of faith. Once again, I was given a unique perspective on just how lucky we are.

From the Rabbi's Study Keeping RCOS strong for generations to come

It was one of those moments you cannot plan for, but you are so grateful when they happen. It was a moment 25 years in the making. I was at Tot Shabbat a couple of

months ago, and a young woman who grew up at RCOS

brought her son and her mother to join us for Tot Shabbat. I have had the pleasure of helping her become a Bat Mitzvah and officiating at her wedding. When I first met her, she was about the same age as her son is now.

Tot Shabbat was its usual chaotic service with children singing, clapping, dancing, wandering around the room, or cuddling into their parents being

shy. This little boy started the morning very shy, not wanting to say hello. He hid behind his mom or with his grandma pretending he was not listening or taking part. When it came time for the story, he inched a little closer so he could see the pictures in the book. Afterward, we headed for our oneg, so the children could play together. It was during this time that something magical happened.

I was checking out what each of the children was playing with, and then I discovered a small hand grabbing mine leading me over to play with him. We sat down and he began showing me what he was doing. Here I was sitting on the floor playing with the next generation as I did with

the generation before. It wasn't a big deal for anyone else, except maybe mom and grandma, but it meant a great deal to me. It was a reminder of why I do what I do and why the synagogue is such an important place.

Judaism regularly reminds us of the importance of doing things L'dor va'Dor, from "Generation to Generation." It is meant to remind us that we are not just doing things for our benefit but for the benefit of generations to come. The synagogue may not look the same and the way we do things may continue to evolve, but part of the point is making sure that the synagogue is here to serve future generations of Jewish families. Those who came before us made

sure that Oheb Sholom was here for us. Now, we need to do the same.

Times are tough for synagogues all over. We continue to need gifts of both time and treasure to survive. If you can be a little more generous with your support of the congregation, that would be a big help.
