On the last day of school, after school, the Youth Committee, once again, will be holding a special parking lot party. Be on the lookout for more information. While usually we would have our breakfast with the Rabbi on the last day of school, this year, to spread out the fun, we will be holding our breakfast earlier in the month. In the past there have been bagels, waffles, pancakes and fruit. Who knows what special treats await our students this year.

Jewish education doesn't just stop with the summer. There are many options for learning and especially practicing (think Hebrew!!!). Here are some options:

For Hebrew Practice:

1. Go to Store.behrmanhouse.com. Scroll down until you see Play & Learn. Click on it. There are games and ways to practice Hebrew, both learning and practicing letters as well as prayers. You and your children can also play "Jewpardy."

2. Dahbear is another Hebrew option. Go to dahbear.org/lists/. Click on "select teacher" and type Holly Michelson into the search. It will take you to lists I've made over the years of beginning vocabulary, letters, fun miscellaneous vocabulary, Purim words, Passover words, and so much more. Once you've picked a list, you can do a matching game, a memory game, or just flashcards.

Things to do as a family that reinforce our teaching of values:

- 1. Do Hebrew WITH vour child.
- 2. Read a Jewish novel/book together.
 - 3. Attend services.
- 4. Bake a challah for Shabbat.
- 5. Create a family Shabbat ritual.
- 6. Learn two new Jewish songs.
- 7. Make cards for people who are isolated or ill (these can be given to the Rabbi to distribute).
 - 8. Clean up trash at a lake.
- 9. Raise money for a social justice organization.
- 10. Donate to a local food pantry.
- 11. Take a trip to the Jewish Museum in Philadelphia.
- 12. Collect tzedakah each Shabbat and decide where to donate it.

One of my students today offered the best explanation of why we start Jewish holidays, including Shabbat, in the evening. From the Rabbi's Study

Be sure to smile and laugh this summer

Pretend that you are a woman, nearly 100 years old, and a visitor stops by to tell you that you are about to have a baby. How do you

think you would react? You would probably

wonder about the sanity of your visitor or think that someone was trying to pull a practical joke, knowing that your child-bearing years are well behind you. You might even start to laugh. I know that I would.

This is exactly what happens to our matriarch Sarah in the Torah. The three angels that come to visit Abraham foretold of the birth of a child to Abraham and Sarah in their old age. What did Sarah do? She laughed. This becomes so important that when this miracle child is born, he is named Yitzchak (Isaac)

meaning "and he will laugh."

Our rabbis understood the importance of happiness and laughter. In Pirkei Avot, one of the great ethical works within our tradition, we are taught in two different places: "Receive every person with a cheerful face," and then just a bit later, "receive every person with happiness." (PA 1:15 & 3:16)

In a later text we are taught, "if a person gives his friend all the finest gifts in the world, but does so with a pained/grumpy face, Torah considers it as if he had given him nothing at all. But one who receives his friend with a smile, even if he gives him nothing, Torah considers it as if he had given him all the finest gifts in the world." (Avot DeRabbi Natan 13:4)

Science is confirming what our tradition knew

all along laughter, humor, and even a simple smile are good for us and those around us. It can relax the muscles, improve blood flow to the brain and even improve our digestive and immune health. In some ways, laughter is the "best medicine."

We also know that laughter and joy can be incredible opportunities for bonding. The old saw says, "You can laugh or you can cry." Laughter is one of the ways our people have survived.

Unfortunately, we seem to live in a world that is trying to distance us from these simple, yet important pleasures. The media portrays everything as a conflict. Joy and laughter are painted as frivolous and unproductive and push us to live in a colorless, serious atmosphere that can sap the life out of anyone.

As we prepare for the summer, I take the opportunity to bring some joy, happiness, and laughter into your lives. Not just for your sake, but for the sake of your family and those around you.

Permit yourself to share a joke with a friend. Smile at the people you may meet when you are outside. Play a game with family and friends and don't worry that it is not "productive" or "structured" time. Learn a new blessing for seeing a rainbow, visiting someplace inspiring, or trying a new food to thank God for the incredible world around us

Try to escape from the pressures and assumptions of the world that can wear us down and give yourself and others, as Rabbi Natan taught, "the finest gifts in the world."

Due to a multitude of injuries as a result of his Army service, Steven has been retired for the last 10 years. His relationship with RCOS was fostered by Rabbi Michelson after they met while Steven was a patient in Reading Hospital. As a retiree, Steven plays competitive pool, In the American Pool Players Association. He resides in Exeter Township with his daughter.
