Get ready for High Holy Days at Selichot service

It's an old joke: A man stops someone on the streets of New York and asks, "How do I get to Carnegie Hall?" The person who was stopped looks back

at him and says, "Practice! Practice!"

I was thinking a lot about this joke as I watched portions of the recent Olympic and Para-Olympic games from Paris. I am awed by the athletic abilities displayed and people performing feats that I cannot even fantasize about doing myself. I marvel at the years of practice and preparation to be an Olympic or Para-Olympic athlete.

Ask any Olympian, he or

she will tell you that it takes years and years of training, discipline, guidance and instruction to reach the level of competence and excellence. Like most things in life, preparation is the key to success.

Yet, we forget that our faith and our spirits need training, as well, to be their very best.

We know that the High Holy Days are some of the most important days of the year, but what do we do to prepare ourselves for this special time? We expect the words, prayers, readings, and music to affect us: to move us (and, hopefully, sometimes they do).

However, just being moved is not the point. We want these

Days of Awe to speak to us, to move us, and to challenge us to move ourselves. We have to struggle and wrestle to do the spiritual examination and introspection that are meant to be a part of these holidays. As the exercise adage says, "No pain — no gain".

One of the ways we get ready is by starting the holidays a bit earlier than the New Year, with the Selichot service.

Selichot, Saturday evening Sept. 28 at 10 p.m., is the first time we say, hear and try to internalize the message of the High Holiday season. It is traditionally done late in the evening — we will be doing our joint service with Kesher Zion after the Reading Symphony Orchestra's first concert — because we are tired and some of our usual defenses may be peeled away. We are rusty, sluggish, and unpracticed.

The Selichot service reminds us of the work that needs to be done in the weeks ahead and it offers us the opportunity to get into a training routine and to prepare ourselves for these important days.

Selichot may not get us to Carnegie Hall or win us an Olympic medal, but it can remind us that with sincerity and discipline, we can begin to transform our lives.

May 5785 be a year filled with health, happiness, and hope for a good year in the year to come.

Welcome to a new school year. This year we are fortunate to have the holidays "late," so that we can actually teach about them in school before they happen instead of trying to squish them into a week or two and hope it all makes sense.

What does it mean to say we have a values-based curriculum? Some might say "why do we teach these, we have values in our homes." Its not just about teaching the values, it is about teaching Torah using actual texts, Prophets, Life cycle, holidays, Holocaust, prayers and history through the lens of Jewish values. The hope is to help students apply the values they've learned to real-world situations.

Koach HaDibbur, one of the values we teach, is about understanding the power of words. In third grade, the focus is on Moses and his speech and choosing one's words carefully. In

another grade, they study a text from Pirkei Avot about actions speaking louder than words.

Yet another class uses a Torah text about the importance of words in the community. In our oldest class they talk about social media, freedom of speech, and the retelling of the story of Passover. Torah, Ancient Jewish writings, holidays, real life.

Happy surprises abound at rummage sale

I thought it was some kind of vintage ironing board. There was a triangular shaped top, with an indentation in it where an iron could go, and two long rods fastened to a large rectangular yellow and green base.

We gathered around it, trying to solve the puzzle this mysterious item presented. Finally, an "aha!" moment when someone discovered screws taped to it and a handwritten sheet of paper with instructions on how to fasten it to the ceiling: it was an authentic mid-century modern light fixture!

I didn't see how it would sell — it was enormous, and the wiring was definitely original. Someone priced it, and two volunteers schlepped it over to the "Housewares" table. Within the first hour of the Sisterhood's annual rummage sale, I watched an intrepid shopper haul it to the register and pay for their windfall.

That's one of my favorite things about the rummage sale — you never know what you're going to find! Treasures abound, both recognizable and obscure. When someone brings in a box of Generation One Transformers, I know those will sell: the light fixture was a big surprise!

This year's sale had an abundance of items, with everything from curios to tchotchkes to jewelry to art, and, of course, practical items, like kitchen appliances, china and clothing for the entire family. Shoppers

loved unearthing bargains, whether it was a brand new pair of shoes for \$5, a juicer still in the package for \$10, or a beautiful black amethyst iridescent Carnival glass vase for \$10. I even witnessed one early bird customer do a fist pump when she snagged a nearly new piece of luggage for \$5.

While the three days of the sale are exhilarating, none of it would be possible without the work of many volunteers in the two weeks preceding the sale. Once rummage sale collection begins, a small but dedicated army of volunteers begin to sort, fold, arrange and price items. Then, for the three days of the sale, volunteers greet shoppers, check them out, make deals, and, sometimes,

offer encouragement to patrons who are trying on clothing and want to know if they should make a purchase.

After the shopping ends, the remaining items are donated to Community Aid and Spring Valley Church, and a dedicated crew sorts and packs the left-over rummage to free up the social hall for the next Oneg.

Thank you so much to everyone who assisted this year, with preparing, running, baking and cleaning up after the sale. Your help is invaluable and very much appreciated.


