Volunteers make Food Festival a success

A tremendous thank you to everyone who participated in the 24th Annual Food and Cultural Festival. The challenging work put into the setup, day of the event and cleanup was utterly amazing among about 100 volunteers serving over 1,000 customers!

We are also extremely proud of the Temple youth who participated.

A special shout out to all those who baked about 300 of our famous Apple Cakes. WOW to all of you!!!! Also, congratulations to my fellow committee members for their success and dedication through nine months of planning (including our Chicken BBQ, which acts as a trial run).

We also want to thank everyone who purchased items, donated baskets or placed an ad in our ad book. Making money for the Temple is our main goal; however we felt that this year, cultural and entertainment activities were important to emphasize, and we succeeded in having several guests take part in these activities.

Now for what we accomplished: Although not all the numbers are in yet, revenues set another record. Including record ad sales, in early returns we believe our total gross revenue exceeded \$87,000. We expect the net to the Temple willbe between around 50% or over \$40,000.

We bought sharp new aprons as a gift to the Temple. Everyone looked great and acted professionally. We fully implemented our four Square Restaurant Terminals for better inventory control and data gathering to help us predict future demand. We plan to buy at least one more terminal as early-morning crowds were extremely large for only four stations.

We added a few new food items to our offering including kugel, tongue, and additional bakery items. We will reevaluate item offerings for next year based on sales and profitability of these items, intense data analysis and any comments we receive.

Summing it all up —, we did well, and our volunteers are responsible. Special recognition to others who have put in countless hours and taken on additional responsibility: Ellen & Jake Azrael, Scott Davis, Laurie Waxler, Cantor Binder, Mark Nemirow, Esther Shanahan and Emily Hollinger.

The power of kindness on display

Religious School Director First of all, thank you to all of the students and their families who helped out at the Food Festival.

So much will be going on in December. On Dec.13, our Sixth/Seventh grade class will be leading our Erev Shabbat services for the congregation. This is the first of our class-led services this year. Please join us and the community in supporting them and their hard work.

Also in December, on Sundays and Tuesdays during Religious School, we will once again have Chanukah "stuff" available for sale. In addition to what we had last year, we will have stuffed animals, note cards, socks, and more. No credit cards.

If you will be teaching about Chanukah in your child's weekday class, we have created Chanukah boxes that you can borrow. The box includes historical information, a suggested lesson plan, a Chanukah menorah, candles, dreidels with directions on how to play, and a children's book.

The time you take can make a big difference to your child and to their friends' knowledge about Judaism and tolerance of people of different faiths. Please let me or Rabbi Michelson know if there is anything else you need to help you teach.

Last month I told the story of the kindness I witnessed among one of the classes. I cannot resist telling you another. This comes from a new child who had not been in our school before. She was visiting her grade's class for the day before her parents decided if she would join us for the rest of the year. This is what I received from her mother (names have been removed). "When we left there, I told [my child] you know I always called this Hebrew school just because that's what I'm used to from when I grew up but it's not Hebrew school because that's on Tuesdays. She said well, can we just call it kindness school because it seems like we're learning a lot about kindness and I responded 'absolutely'." Thanks to that mom who shared her story.

From the Rabbi's Study Bringing light to our lives at Hanukkah

The country is fully into the Christmas season, and there's nothing wrong with that. I am not threatened by Christmas. On the contrary, I think Christmas is nice.

People become happier, they sing beautiful songs —

especially the ones that Jews wrote — and the Western world seems to take a vacation from the pessimism of the other 11 months of the year.

There was a time, to be sure when Christmas was a threat to Jews. In Europe, Christmas was a time to harass the Jews even more than usual. It was a time to go to hide from drunken Cossacks who would be only too pleased to kill any Jews who crossed their merry path. As challenging as things are today, I don't think we have returned to these dangerous times.

I don't mind if people wish me a Merry Christmas, and that happens all the time, even with my kippah on. Why should I get mad if people wish me well? I'll take any happy wishes I can get of any flavor. I don't usually object and say, "Oh, I'm a Jew, I don't celebrate Christmas." I say, "Thanks, Merry Christmas to you, too." By cheerfully receiving and returning these Yuletide wishes, we extend an olive branch to another faith community. When I say Merry Christmas, I'm not saying, "Wow, I wish I was Christian." I'm saying, "I wish you well as you

celebrate your holiday."

Hanukkah is about bringing light into our lives when the world is at its darkest. The days are short, and it can be depressing. We're not the only religion that has a festival of light. Many Eastern religions observe Diwali, a festival that celebrates light over darkness, good over evil, and knowledge over ignorance. Easter and Christmas are Christian festivals of light. Muslims hang special lanterns on Eid al Fitr, the holiday at the end of Ramadan.

Light is vitally important to many religions, and that should come as no surprise. The American philosopher and scientist Dan Dennet argues that human religion should be studied just like

any other biological phenomenon. We humans are religious because religion has proved to have evolutionary value in our lives.

Hanukkah is our annual declaration that we, as Jews, are still here. Hanukkah does not have to compete with any other holiday. Just as Hanukkah reminds us of the importance of light, we are expected, by our actions and conduct, to bring light into the world.

will need to be returned by Feb. 1 to qualify for consideration.


Applications will be reviewed and interviews will be held between February and April. Scholarship winners will be announced May 1.
