NJCO provides free lunches in the city four days a week and a food pantry on the fifth. The Temple has been working with New Journey in its various forms for over 30 years. I often volunteered to help prepare and serve lunch on days when the Temple provided volunteers. It was a powerful

moment to serve people what might be their only complete meal for the day. It was a reminder of how lucky I am and how close many of us are to living with food insecurity. "There, but for the grace of God, go I."

## How can we build on growing membership trend?

Over the past 18 months, we have welcomed 21 new members/families to RCOS, bringing our current total to 200 families. There are many reasons our new members have joined us — they recently moved to the area, they started a family and want their children to have a Jewish education, they recently completed their conversion process, or they simply wanted to reconnect with their Jewish "roots." (I would like to think it's because of my outstanding skills as chair of the Membership Committee, but I'm

afraid that's not it!)

According to a 2024 Jewish Federation of North America report:

- Jewish life in America is changing at a rapid pace.
- Events [10/7 attacks, war in Gaza, rising antisemitism, and campus protests] have fueled an explosion in Jewish belonging and communal participation.
- Jews are feeling more invested in their identity and community and looking for ways to connect.
- Of the 83% of Jews who were "only somewhat," "not very" or "not at all engaged" prior to 10/7, 40% are now showing up in larger numbers in Jewish life.

- The surge of individuals includes every age demographic.
- Among Jews who are not members of synagogues, 37% say they would be open to joining one now.

This surge of interest in Jewish belonging is a positive trend. Building a strong and engaged Jewish community is critical, so the Membership Committee will continue to foster strong connections with current members as well as grow our membership base. Our role at RCOS is to attract new members and engage current ones through outreach, networking, and social events. We sponsor several events throughout the year including: two or three Happy Hours, the

Spring + Fall Musical Shabbats, the Spring + Fall Speaker Series, and the New Member/Teacher Appreciation Shabbat. We also publish the Membership Directory annually to help members stay connected.

Feb. 1 is the deadline to subnmit applications to the Liefter-Fein Memorial Scholarship Fund Committee for 2025-2026 academic year awards.

The application form is available at ohebsholom.org. Completed applications will need to be returned by Feb. 1 to

qualify for consideration. Applications will be reviewed and interviews held between February and April. Scholarship winners will be announced May 1.

The Liefter-Fein Memorial Scholarship Fund was established in 1971 by Nathan and Allerta Fein and has been supplemented by a major donation from Joseph Liefter.

The income from this fund is used to provide scholarships for higher education to children of members of our congregation in good standing.

The awards are based on academic achievement, need, and character. The size of the scholarship(s) is dependent on the

income from the fund.

And because traditions


change and evolve, this year we are including younger members of our congregation. We have to plant seeds for spiels to come!
